Formal Strategic Update 2012

On October 1st and 2nd, JTHS will embark upon a 2-day Formal Strategic Update. This is a board-sanctioned opportunity to review, update, and extend the plan for good cause.

While JTHS has made significant progress, an update is necessary for two reasons.

First, changes in society continue after the board approves a Strategic Plan. For example, new state education mandates and a reduction of educational funding have had a significant impact upon the current Strategic Plan.

Second, as action plans are followed, changes may be necessary to deepen implementation. In addition, JTHS may find that some action plans have become obsolete.

JTHS will communicate the results of the update upon completion. We look forward to the process of continued school improvement.

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Accountability - Strategic Planning Progress Report

A formal Strategic Planning Progress Report was recently delivered to the 29 members of the Strategic Planning Team.

The purpose of the progress report was to review the district's progress on achieving objectives and implementing strategies. The secondary purpose was to discuss the implementation schedule in light of the 2012-2013 budget. The accomplishments below reflect District 204's Strategic Planning efforts.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS WHAT WE'VE ACHIEVED

Freshman Academy

All ninth graders enter the Freshman Academy, a small school-within-a-school that assists with the transition to high school. Freshmen begin the day a period earlier, which allows them to take an additional elective or receive help in math and/or reading.

JTHS Career Academies

All students choose one of five career-based small learning communities which provides an individualized education relevant to students' career interests. Teams of teachers work together to prepare interdisciplinary lessons that relate to the academy's focus.

Advisory Program

Guides students through their high school plan and transition to post-secondary experience by establishing a relationship with a teacher mentor beginning in the student's freshman year.

College Prep & Honors Curriculum

All JTHS students receive a rigorous and relevant education through a College Prep or Honors curriculum aligned to state and national standards.

JTHS CURRICULUM & INSTRUCTION EMPOWERING STUDENTS TO COMPETE AND CONTRIBUTE

The 2011-2012 School Year closed with JTHS on the brink of unprecedented change and innovation. The 1:1 computing initiative promises to grant students 24/7 access to their education; professional development provides teachers with the support necessary to teach 21st century learners; and our academy structure continues to provide students with relevant instruction as they prepare for both college and career.

COMMON CORE STANDARDS

In January of 2011, Illinois became one of 40 states that committed to the adoption of the Common Core State Standards for English-language arts and mathematics. The intention of the Common Core Standards Initiative is to establish a rigorous set of standards that provide clear, consistent, academic benchmarks that are aligned from grades K-12. The overall goal is to better prepare students for success in college and the workforce.

Implementation of the Common Core is a multi-phase initiative. Full implementation will begin in 2014 with a new assessment system that measures student growth and academic performance in relation to the established benchmarks.

To actively prepare for the Common Core, JTHS has integrated a 5-year approach to curriculum design and alignment, which began during the 2011-2012 School Year. Teams of teachers and administrators are working with JTHS Curriculum Directors to ensure the development of curricula and assessments that incorporate the Common Core with the JTHS Strategic Plan, academy structure and 1:1 computing initiative.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

In alignment with the Common Core, JTHS Programs of Study provide a comprehensive template for educational planning that students can follow during high school to successfully transition to post-secondary education or the workplace.

Designed to assist in the selection of appropriate classes within a student's academy and Career Interest Pathway, the Programs of Study are the newest addition to the JTHS Course Offerings Guide, which was launched electronically and posted to www.jths.org for the first time during the 2011-2012 School Year.

Electronic viewing of each Program of Study provides a consistent format. Required courses and recommended electives are contained within each Program of Study Chart. It is an interactive document that contains links that will bring the viewer to specific course descriptions once clicked upon.

EPAS ASSESSMENT EPAS ASSESSMENT

The Common Core assessments will provide high-quality data used to measure student progress from one grade level to the next. JTHS currently uses the Educational Planning and Assessment System (EPAS) growth model of assessment, which is consistent with the expectations of the Common Core.

The EPAS system contains three assessments: EXPLORE, which is taken during the 8th and 9th grade; PLAN, which is taken during grade 10; and ACT, which is taken during grade 11 or 12.

TRACKING STUDENT GROWTH


Using ACT's study entitled, "How Much Growth toward College Readiness is Reasonable to Expect in High School?" JTHS developed an academic information monitoring system that provides teachers and administrators with a comprehensive analysis of academic growth between EPAS levels.

The foundation for the EPAS scoring system is ACT's College Readiness Standards, which include EXPLORE benchmark scores that categorize students into 3 categories: "On Target" students who met or exceeded the EXPLORE College Readiness Benchmark; "Nearly On Target" students who were within 2 or fewer points from meeting the benchmark; and "Off Target" students who were more than 2 points from the benchmark.

JTHS OBTAINS STUDENT BASELINE DATA FROM 8TH GRADE EXPLORE TEST RESULTS

The graphs on the following page illustrate district growth for the Class of 2012 in reading and math as compared to the ACT study. The Class of 2012 data will serve as a baseline for future data collection and will allow JTHS to compare growth from one class to the next.

JTHS CLASS OF 2012 DATA SHOWS GROWTH IN ALL THREE CATEGORIES FOR MATH AND READING.



CONCLUSIONS

The score increase from EXPLORE to PLAN was above the ACT average for reading in all three categories of students and was only slightly lower in math for students "On Target" and "Nearly On Target."

"Off Target" students were above the average in math and reading.

The score increase from PLAN to ACT was slightly below the ACT average in math and reading for all three categories.

1:1 COMPUTING

This fall (2012-2013) ALL incoming freshmen (Class of 2016) will receive a ByteSpeed NL2 Classmate computer to use in school and at home.

Our long-term goal is for every student, grades 9-12, to have a computing device; however, we are beginning our implementation with freshmen only.

Beginning in 2014, 21st century technology-based assessments will be administered to all students in Illinois. The JTHS 1:1 computing initiative will prepare students for these new, online tests.

1:1 technology provides anytime/anywhere learning and opens the doors to the critical thinking and problem solving skills that students need to compete and contribute in our global society.

CLASSROOM INSTRUCTION

The ByteSpeed NL2 Classmate computers are designed for educational purposes and have a keyboard and tablet. There is a stylus for use with the tablet, so students can take notes, work on math problems, or work on art projects through lessons in class or at home.

COST NEUTRAL

In preparation for the program, JTHS has reduced the cost associated with textbooks, copying and printing. With these reductions, along with other cost-saving measures, this is a cost neutral initiative.

JT LEARN

To support the 1:1 computing environment, JTHS has developed JT Learn, an online educational environment for teacher and student collaboration. JT Learn allows teachers to upload assignments, facilitate online discussions, post grades, and more. JT Learn encourages support and collaborative learning anytime, anywhere.



ADVANCED PLACEMENT ACHIEVEMENT LIST

On November 1, 2011 Joliet Township High School became one of 367 school districts in the nation recognized by the College Board with a place on its prestigious second annual AP Achievement List. This is the second consecutive year that JTHS has earned this honor for opening AP classroom doors to a significantly broader pool of students, while maintaining or improving the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher.

The improvement of AP results takes a sustained effort. Inclusion in the 2nd Annual AP District Honor Roll is based upon the following criteria:

- Examination of three years of AP data, from 2009 to 2011
- Increase in participation in/access to AP by at least 4 percent in large districts, at least 6 percent in medium districts and at least 11 percent in small districts
- A steady or increasing percentage of exams taken by African American, Hispanic/Latino and American Indian/Alaska Native students
- Performance levels maintained or improved when comparing the percentage of students in 2011 scoring a 3 or higher to those in 2009, or the school has already attained a performance level in which more than 70 percent of the AP students are scoring a 3 or higher



THE STATE OF SCHOOL FINANCE LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

While JTHS is a fiscally stable school district, there are many factors that are creating financial uncertainty in public schools across the state of Illinois.

DECLINE IN PROPERTY VALUES


The decline in the economy continues to have a direct impact upon the district's ability to levy and collect tax dollars. Legislation has been introduced that could potentially stop our capacity to capture increases in assessed values due to new construction. The bill also holds public school districts to a zero increase in tax collections. This means no new local revenue, which puts the funding of JTHS education at great risk.


JTHS DISTRICT 204 FINANCIAL PLAN

To protect the education of our youth, JTHS is proactive in its financial planning for the future. A ten percent reduction in purchased services, supplies, and capital outlay expenditures began in March of 2012 and will continue throughout the 2012-2013 School Year. At this point, educational programs and services will not be affected by these financial factors. However, if proposed legislation is passed, it will have a drastic impact upon all aspects of our educational offerings.



REDUCTIONS IN STATE AID

JTHS receives approximately \$900 per pupil, per year in General State Aid. The last payment for 2011-2012 was eliminated at the end of the school year. Although the Illinois Constitution states that Illinois financial support should equal 51 percent of the local school district's revenue, our Illinois state-supported funding has been drastically lower.



EXTERNAL INFLUENCES

Proposed Illinois State Legislation regarding pension reform and transportation are external influences that JTHS continues to monitor. A fiscally conservative approach guides the district budgeting process in a time of financial uncertainty.

PENSION REFORM

Illinois is responsible for funding a portion of the Teacher's Retirement System (TRS). There is currently a legislative proposal that would eliminate the state's contribution to TRS, shifting this responsibility to local tax payers and school districts. This legislation would result in a \$2.5 million reduction in the JTHS budget.

TRANSPORTATION

Although Illinois has already reduced transportation funding by 40 percent, Governor Quinn has proposed the total elimination of transportation funding for school districts. If this were to occur, JTHS would lose over \$1.4 million per year.





A change in the federal government's formula for calculating the high school graduation rate has led to lower graduation rates across Illinois. The new formula more accurately tracks the number of ninth graders who go on to graduate in four years. It was developed to eliminate discrepancies due to varying formulas used by states, the federal government and independent researchers. The previous formula included students who graduated in more than four years.

Implementation of the new formula has resulted in decreased graduation rates across the state of Illinois.


JTHS CHARACTER CAMPAIGN 7 Words Make a Difference

The Character Campaign was launched at the beginning of the 2011-2012 School Year to promote the 7 attributes of Compassion, Confidence, Respect, Responsibility, Integrity, Perseverance, and Tolerance to our students, staff and community. The 7 attributes are unique to Joliet Township High School and are an important part of providing our students with the necessary characteristics to compete and contribute as respectful, responsible, and productive citizens.

Funded through donations, the campaign included the distribution of t-shirts, yard signs, posters, cards, pins and more. A website, www.jthscharacter. org, has been launched to provide information regarding the campaign and includes student and staff spotlights.

In addition, the attributes are woven into the fabric of our schools through consistent expectations and communication by JTHS staff. Student-produced commercials advertise the attributes on the Student News Networks and student-athletes read the definitions of the attributes at varsity athletic events.

On March 20, 2012, Mayor Tomas Giarrante and the City of Joliet honored JTHS with a proclamation acknowledging the work of the JTHS character campaign and the impact it has had upon our schools and community.



JTHS CYBORGS FIRST ROBOTICS COMPETITION

In January of 2012, Joliet Township High School students were challenged to design, build and program a unique robot in 45 days. The challenge was accepted, and the JTHS Cyborgs were formed.

The robot was designed specifically to compete in the FIRST Robotics Competition which was held on March 22nd - 24th at the UIC Pavilion. Joliet competed among 53 robotic teams from seven different states in a "Rebound Rumble" basketball challenge. The students built the remote controlled robot specifically to shoot baskets through 4 rounds of ultimate high-tech competitions.

FIRST is the acronym "For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology." True to its name, the students learned in-depth skills relating to science and technology during the construction of the robot and through participation in the competition. The relevant educational experience enhanced student knowledge of teamwork, organization, time management and trouble shooting, while applying the practical applications of science and math to the engineering process.

CHICAGOLAND SPEEDWAY BENCHMARK PROJECT


Last November 2011, Chicagoland Speedway and Joliet Township High School teamed up to provide an interdisciplinary curricular experience for students. The purpose of this partnership, known as the BenchMark Project, was to develop the business skills of students while simultaneously raising money for local charities.

During this project, students worked with high school staff and members of Chicagoland Speedway to design, construct and sell benches to be placed on Chicagoland Speedway grounds. Students were provided with hands-on experience as they applied extensive research, business planning, drafting, constructing, marketing, public relations, information technology and many other skills needed to succeed in today's professional world. In addition, The Benchmark Project taught students how to develop and manage a comprehensive business plan, while also requiring the students to implement a sales plan for securing sponsors.

Thanks to the generous support of our community, JTHS students raised \$20,000 for local charities by selling all 20 of the benches that were constructed through the program. Joliet Central High School selected the G.W. Buck Boys and Girls Club as their beneficiary and presented them with \$10,000; while Joliet West divided the funds equally with a \$5,000 contribution to the Will County Humane Society and \$5,000 to the Make-A-Wish Foundation.
